THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN BEING LUCKY AND BEING GOOD Tradition of Excellence Maintained at Gamma Omega

It is often said that anyone can be lucky once, but being able to repeat a performance is the difference between being lucky and being good. In the spring of 2011, the Gamma Omega undergraduates won the Chapter of Excellence Award from the Penn State Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life. Under the presidential leadership of **Chris Tomaselli '13**, the Taus went on to secure the first True Merit Award from the National Fraternity since 2003.

It became obvious to the now outgoing president, **Tyler Parsels '13**, that a key to winning True Merit was achieving the Chapter of Excellence Award. Through his leadership, Gamma Omega reached this goal in April. The same week, I signed the forms for submission of the True Merit application to National. Repeating a feat is the demonstration of being truly good at the accomplishment. This summer, the Taus will find out if they, again, will be True Merit winners.

When I was asked to be the president of the House Corporation Board several years ago, I stated that we would focus on improving the chapter by bettering the aggregate grade point average, improving the physical plant, and improving our recruitment. My job is to advise and coach. Anyone can coach a good team. And a good team is what the leaders of the Gamma Omega Chapter had this year. The chapter saw success in recruitment, academics, and philanthropy, making the 2011-12 school year a triumphant one for Gamma Omega. The next challenge will be for our new class of leaders to again achieve Chapter of Excellence and True Merit. • Strong Campus Presence Helps Yield 34 New Members

• Undergraduates Excel in Philanthropy, Academics

What a fun and busy year it has been for the Gamma Omega Chapter. This year, our chapter received the distinct recognition as a Chapter of Excellence by the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life for the second consecutive year. Only nine of 46 IFC fraternities received this distinction. The brotherhood worked hard in the areas of philanthropy and community service activities, recruitment, intramural sports, and academics. As we head into the summer, we can all feel proud of what we have accomplished this year as a chapter.

Gamma Omega GPA Moves Up 11 Spots in IFC Rankings

Academics have been a major focal point with our chapter. Every semester since the fall of 2010, we have improved our GPA. Last fall, we raised our GPA to a 3.04 and moved up 11 spots

in the IFC fraternity rankings. Scholarship Chairman and Vice President Chris Craddock '13 says, "I am glad we are making progress as a chapter but know we need to keep getting better and improving in this area."

Philanthropic Success Seen Throughout School Year

We continue to excel philanthropically. This year, Gamma Omega, along with our fundraising partners Zeta Tau Alpha sorority, helped raise over \$330,000 for Penn State's Dance Marathon, which helps children fight pediatric cancer. This was the second highest amount we have ever raised and also made us the number one Greek fundraiser for the 16th straight year, contributing to the record-breaking \$10.6 million THON total. For the first time, we also held a spring philanthropy called GladiAT Ω rs which raised \$500 to help benefit Ben Speaks: a public charity focused on raising suicide awareness, as well as Camp Cadet, which offers young men and women between the ages of 12 and 15 a chance to participate in a weeklong law enforcement academy.

Chapter Boasts 100% Retention Rate in 2011-2012

Gamma Omega saw one of the most successful recruitment years in recent memory. We had 100% retention rates with 22 new members in the fall and 12 in the spring, totaling 34 new members for the 2011-2012 academic year.

Undergraduates Stay Active in Community

Some of the most recent activities we have done as a chapter include signing the Gamma Omega Brother Code and participating in AT Ω Help Day for the very first time. The Gamma Omega Brother Code was signed on March 18 by each brother and states that as a Chapter, we will hold ourselves to a higher standard in terms of integrity, respect, accountability, and forward thinking. We can proudly say we have had zero risk management violations over the entire year and believe this is another great step to improving our brotherhood.

AT Ω Help Day was a brotherhood initiative within the State College community. On April 15, brothers cleaned up trash throughout the neighborhood and participated in the Out of Darkness Community Walk to raise awareness for suicide prevention.

We are very proud of the accomplishments we achieved this year. A big thank-you is needed for all of our alumni. Without your support, we would not be where we are today. You are

always welcome to visit the chapter house.

Travis Williams '92 counts his time in the Gamma Omega Chapter as some of the best times of his life. The road to $AT\Omega$

began in the spring semester of his freshman year after he and some friends decided to go through recruitment after a semester in Penn State's dorms. Travis found that the brotherhood his father experienced as an AT Ω was the drawing point for him to join Gamma Omega.

"I started [recruitment] late in the cycle, and ended up calling AT Ω and speaking with **Russell Troutman** '90," stated Travis. Russ invited Travis to a social where he and **Damion Spahr** '92 spoke for two hours and they invited him into the chapter. "Living in the house was great. I lived there for about two-and-a-

half years. It was neat living with such a diverse group of people, especially since we all got along quite well. I will always remember my friendships and experiences from $AT\Omega$." It didn't hurt, of course, that the house was beautiful after having been refounded just three years prior.

During his junior year, Travis had a change of heart in terms of his educational path. He realized how much he enjoyed people and business and soon switched his major from engineering to a prelaw focus in international politics. After graduating from Penn State, Travis enrolled in law school at Duquesne University, the same place his future wife, Nikki, attended pharmacy school. After graduating law school, Travis married Nikki and started practicing law at Reed Smith L.L.P., where he primarily focused on corporate law but held a small, niche practice in sports. He served as outside counsel for the Pittsburgh Pirates, Buffalo Sabres and Fox Sports Net on a variety of matters and also acted as counsel to Heinz and

Mellon Bank in connection with the naming rights deals for Heinz Field and Mellon Arena, respectively.

In 2008, Travis was approached by the Penguins organization to join them as general counsel and to oversee the construction of CONSOL Energy Center. Under his guidance, the arena project was finished on time and under budget. Travis is now the chief operating officer and general counsel of the Penguins, overseeing finance, legal, technology, human resources, arena operations, and development projects. One of his current projects is the redevelopment of the 28-acre former Mellon Arena site.

He is also the proud father of six children and has become a "hockey dad" for his two oldest sons, Anthony and Mario. He spends time supporting his two daughters, Lucia and Sofia, in their ballet, cheerleading, and musical theater activities, while also keeping track of his two youngest sons, Gino and Bruno.
