



More than \$21,000 Raised toward Scholarship Program Your Help Is Needed to Reach Our \$40,000 Goal

Gamma Omega alumni have always been generous, and when we asked for your support this fall it was no exception. In September, the House Corporation voted to establish two scholarships, the Louis Gomlick Worthy Master Scholarship and the George Greer Leadership Scholarship. These will become permanent awards funded at $AT\Omega$ National Fraternity. The commitment to fully fund both scholarships is \$40,000. Until we reach \$40,000, the annual amount will be given by the House Corporation.

Led by a challenge gift from Eric Domski '89, we raised more than \$15,000 before and after the reunion weekend in October. With large gifts from Scott Smith '89 and John Frain '89, we have raised more than \$21,000. Each dollar contributed is tax deductible.

"These awards will impact undergraduates and honor the large gift of time and treasury that Lou and George have made to the chapter. Please join me in honoring two of our most outstanding alumni," House Corporation President Damion Spahr '92 said.

The Louis Gomlick Worthy Master Scholarship will be awarded to the worthy master anytime Gamma Omega achieves Penn State's Chapter of Excellence recognition or the national fraternity's True Merit Award. The George Greer Leadership Scholarship will be awarded annually to an underclassman who best demonstrates the leadership characteristics that we expect from our members. The chapter will designate three candidates and a panel of alumni will choose the recipient.

Scholarship has been a focal point of Damion's leadership as House Corporation president. Under his guidance, Gamma Omega has risen to earn one of the top GPAs on campus. These new scholarships are part of a three-way commitment from the alumni to the undergraduates, along with the commitment to improving the chapter house and fostering an environment that demonstrates what lifelong brotherhood means. These qualities help Gamma Omega maintain its status as one of the premier fraternities on campus.

Penn State's Director of Fraternity and Sorority Life Provides Insight into Greek Life on Campus

Reflecting on My Six-Year Journey

As I complete my sixth year as director of the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life at Penn State, I am happy to reflect on the journey we have taken together. I have had the pleasure of working with the alumni leadership, national headquarters staff, and, of course, the students who comprise the Gamma Omega Chapter, many of whom I now include in my family of friends.

Largest Greek Community in the Nation

I've witnessed the growth of Penn State's fraternity and sorority community, which now stands as the largest Greek community in the nation, with 92 fraternities and sororities and close to 6,000 undergraduate members. We are fortunate to have some of the most talented men and women serving in leadership roles of our four governing councils: the Multicultural Greek-Letter Council, the Panhellenic Association, the National Panhellenic Council, and the Interfraternity Council.

Finest Governing Council in the Country

The Penn State Interfraternity Council is one of the finest governing councils in the country today, as well as one of the very few student self-governing fraternity systems affiliated with chapters from the North-American Interfraternity Conference. Penn State is proud of its students and their commitment to our community.

Alcohol Eliminated from Recruitment

When I arrived at Penn State six years ago, 8% of the undergraduate student body belonged to one of our recognized fraternities and sororities. Today, we are approaching 15%. Alcohol has been eliminated from Greek recruitment during a time when others claimed students would not want to join unless they were recruited with alcohol. The party scene at Penn State has changed from a six-night-per-week scenario to just three nights on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

Focused on Anti-Hazing Initiatives

During the fall 2012 semester, the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life

planned and hosted the most comprehensive anti-hazing initiative ever attempted in the United States. An individualized anti-hazing program was created based on research conducted with Penn State students where we gathered data that reflected a student's beliefs, attitudes, and feelings related to hazing. A total of 60 one-hour sessions were held during October and November 2012 for groups of 100 members each, where we shared the data and discussed the students' attitudes during highly interactive conversations. Other fraternity and sorority communities throughout the United States have contacted Penn State to learn more about our approach to anti-hazing education and to ask how we were able to provide this level of training to nearly 6,000 members of our Greek community.

ATΩs Provide Leadership on Campus

The Gamma Omega Chapter at Penn State continues to provide leadership as they have led all fraternities in the IFC-Panhellenic Dance Marathon fundraising event for more than 15 years. And, of course, **Tyler Parsels** '13, chapter president in 2011, was named Chapter President of the Year for IFC chapters and Greek Man of the Year. Today, **Lorenzo Massaro** '14 serves as the 2013 IFC executive president and **Tommy Todd** '14 is serving his second consecutive term as chapter president.

Positive Outlook for Greek Community

The future of the Penn State's Greek community looks bright. Our students and their leaders understand and appreciate the challenges of tomorrow. Our alumni play a significant role in supporting and advising our men while they serve as valuable role models who demonstrate a lifelong commitment to Penn State University, our fraternity community, and the Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity.

ERIC DOMSKI '89 PAYS IT FORWARD TO FUTURE GENERATIONS OF GAMMA OMEGA



A: Gamma Omega was at the very beginning of its refounding when I joined. I looked into other fraternities but found that the brothers at AT Ω had a different energy; it felt like they were on a mission. I liked the idea of being able to build our own traditions rather than follow someone else's.



A: In January of 1987, right after Penn State beat Miami 14-10 in the Fiesta Bowl, I was home for winter break during my junior year when a fire demolished my parent's home. It was a challenging time both personally and financially, and as a result I had to take a semester off to earn money. Upon returning to PSU that fall, the brothers allowed me to forgo some of my financial burdens to live in the house, which allowed me to continue with school as a member of $AT\Omega$. You never know how small acts of kindness can affect people's lives.

Q: Where do you work now?

A: I'm the VP of North America Application Sales at Oracle. I work with a team focusing on supply chain management, transportation planning, and warehouse management software applications for large companies. My career has taken me around the world to Europe, India, Australia, and South America. Over the past 20 years, I've had the opportunity to work with companies covering every industry and people from all walks of life.

Q: What motivated you to support the scholarship campaign?

A: It's important to reward those who take on added responsibility, show leadership, and go the extra mile. This scholarship campaign shows tangible backing to what $AT\Omega$ represents and the values we claim. As a parent saving for my children's college and all of the



expenses that go with it, I would look at any organization my child would want to join and evaluate what it stands for. Twenty-five years from now, I hope the brotherhood of today can enjoy the same type of camaraderie that we all felt at our 25th reunion.

I want to thank everyone who participated in the Domski Challenge this fall. It was great to see everyone come out and support these scholarships.

Q: Why do you think it's important for others to support the campaign?

A: With a job that has me traveling three to four days a week and then coming home to help raise my three children, I have found that incorporating some sort of service into my life helps take me out of my own world and into the world of others. In doing so, I have gotten to know some of the most amazing people, people that I would have never gotten to meet otherwise. I've found it to be very rewarding. Spending time and money to support $AT\Omega$ brings this home to an organization where I personally benefited.

With a total of \$367,452.77, the brothers of Gamma Omega were able to significantly contribute to the overall total of \$12,374,034.46 raised for the fight against pediatric cancer.
