It has been a busy year for housing repairs and restoration. We spent \$165,000 of contributions under the direction of our architect, Shephard Restoration Services in Media, Pennsylvania, and lead contractor Structural Maintenance Systems in Malvern, Pennsylvania.

Our upgrades include: new hardwood floors in the dining room, new ResTek flooring for the upstairs kitchen area and third-floor bathroom, complete plumbing upgrade for center code commercial kitchens for the kitchen areas, roof parapet stones fully replaced with copper flashing, chimney brick repointed and both chimney vents capped, new side venting system installed with privacy cage, 20 slate roof shingles replaced, new red room entrance/staircase to

Matt Cabrey '88 Follows the Alpha Tau Omega Way of Life

hen talking with Matt Cabrey '88, it's easy to tell that he is a passionate storyteller. He is able to recall events with vivid detail and enthusiasm, putting the listener in that moment with him. One story that he recalls well is how he decided to join Gamma Omega. It was a moment of chance; Matt and Sean Flatley '87 were walking on campus and came across a flyer inviting men to learn about bringing a fraternity back to Penn State. "It was a meeting to regain the charter for Gamma Omega," Matt says. "The most appealing aspect was that we had



a chance to create something new, shaping an organization that would emphasize leadership and character building. We formed an interest group and then achieved the status of a colony by completeing a series of community service projects and related requirements in order to earn the privilege of receiving our Gamma Omega charter from our national office. Through this process—meetings, projects, and getting to know the other young men who all had this shared vision—it became more compelling to me, and I, along with the other young men, grew enthusiastic about delivering on our goal."

The more he learned about the principles of Alpha Tau Omega—Virtue, Truth, and Love—the more they resonated with Matt, and they continued to define his experience as he met more of the brothers. "The biggest thing I learned was empathy," he says. "How we relate with others, how we learn from what others are experiencing. We had misunderstandings and disagreements, and we needed to identify the issues and overcome them. Gamma Omega helped me grow by providing those experiences."

Matt credits the dedication and vision of a core group of alumni who came before him for breathing new life into Gamma Omega. These brothers from 1950-80 saw something that others did not: a bright, positive future for Gamma Omega. They guided a new era of young men, helping them understand and appreciate the values and understand what it means to be an Alpha Tau Omega brother. Homecoming weekends resonated with

Matt as he got to reconnect with alumni. "These men chose to infuse new life into Gamma Omega," he says. "They created and fostered a specialness that extended beyond the bricks and mortar of a building. As young men helping to shape a new beginning, we really connected with this inspiring vision."

Following his days at Penn State and Alpha Tau Omega, Matt followed his own vision. A career in public relations and corporate communications led him to his current role as executive director of Select Greater

Philadelphia, an organization that infuses a new economic vibrancy across the 11-county neighborhood of Greater Philadelphia. He is the chief storyteller for the region, showcasing its business assets to inspire organizations from around the world to establish and grow their business in Greater Philadelphia.

He has come a long way from his first job after college when he worked the overnight shift at a radio station in Avalon, New Jersey. Matt scored that job by going to the station unannounced and asking for it. That experience and many others taught Matt how to be successful. "When I speak with college students and recent graduates about their careers, I share the importance of being the positive person in the room, setting goals, tapping your network, and that it's OK to ask for help," he says. "Most importantly, young people launching their careers have to go for it! You're only going to get that job, meet that person, or achieve a positive outcome when you go for it."

Matt lives in Exton, Pennsylvania, with his wife, Terry, and their three children: Alex, Courtney, and Luke. In his free time, he enjoys biking along the boardwalk in Ocean City, New Jersey, the Chester Valley trail in Chester County, and Kelly Drive in Philadelphia. Undergraduates Help Raise \$257,678 for THON, Excel in **Academics and Intramurals**

This year, Gamma Omega under well serious several problems occurred early in the fall semester. The chapter This year, Gamma Omega underwent serious changes. As a chapter, was alerted by our national fraternity of several serious risk management violations, resulting in a social probationary period. Shortly after this probationary period was implemented, a new executive board took the reins of the chapter. These issues and difficulties forced us all to open our eyes and improve all aspects of fraternity life.

Today, I can proudly say that as a chapter we are positively responding and benefitting from the changes. Our house corporation and national fraternity aided us throughout this process as we worked with consultants Dave Westol, founder of Limberlost Consulting, Bryan Murray, Marietta College '14, and Jaden Brown, Indiana State '11, to help us find our way and improve our brotherhood through the Pursuit Program. This program aims to have the leaders of the chapter regain control and start directing our actions more in line with the values of the Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity.

The executive board transitioned during a tumultuous time and adjusted to these tough changes. After taking the advice of our consultants, the chapter reached out to alumni in an effort to coordinate events and make the entire brotherhood stronger. The consultants informed us that a major problem in our brotherhood was a division between pledge classes. The executive board took this seriously and started coordinating events for the entire chapter. We are emphasizing the meaning and importance of brotherhood. Young men join a fraternity to be a part of a complete and unified chapter. We fully intended on providing this unparalleled and incomparable experience. This past fall, we hosted a paintball event, ski trips, movie showings, sporting event viewings, and much more. These events showed great success and were the first step in bringing everyone together. We upgraded our dining and chapter rooms with furniture, rugs, and televisions. It is great to see a more unified chapter that feels a lot more like a brotherhood.

This year, we celebrated the 25th anniversary of our THON partnership with Zeta Tau Alpha. Our organization ranked first among all paired Greek organizations for the 22nd year in a row. THON 2016 fundraising efforts helped raise an astounding \$257,678. The chapter GPA is consistently in the top five on campus and remains there this year. One of the great things our consultants informed us of was that we, as an Alpha Tau Omega chapter, raise the most money for philanthropy, and we have the fourth highest GPA of all Alpha Tau Omega chapters. Our intramural teams have been spectacular, with our basketball team leading the way with an undefeated record entering the playoffs. Our softball and soccer
